One specific omission from our *machzor*[1] that I want to lift up now for consideration is the conclusion of the traditional Torah reading for the first morning of Rosh Hashanah. We read [past tense] this morning Genesis 21: 1-21, the story of the birth and weaning of Isaac, the rivalry between Isaac's mother Sarah and Ishmael's mother Hagar, and God's promise that, though the Jewish people would descend from Isaac, yet Ishmael would also become a great nation.

However, the traditional reading found in Reconstructionist, Conservative and Orthodox machzorim continues through the end of Genesis 21. In this section, Genesis 21: 22-34, the Torah portrays our patriarch Abraham as a diplomat negotiating a treaty with a potentially hostile neighboring people, namely the Philistines of Gerar, under their King Abimelekh:

Why is this story part of the traditional Torah reading for the first day of Rosh Hashanah? I suppose the prosaic answer would be that we just want to keep going to the end of chapter 21 so that we can pick up tomorrow with the binding of Isaac story that starts immediately thereafter at the start of Genesis chapter 22. However, I'd like to think that this story has more significance than being just "filler."

That episode ends amicably, but surely Abimelekh hasn't forgotten it when he approaches Abraham in the last section of the traditional first day of Rosh Hashanah Torah reading.

We see so many instances in the world in which differing religious and cultural beliefs and traditions can cause conflict. And so, the story of potential adversaries Abraham and Abimelekh establishing peaceful relations through diplomacy is a counter-narrative to the narrative of violent religious fanaticism that mars our contemporary world.

In an earlier incident, recounted in Genesis chapter 20, Abraham and Sarah had gone to Gerar seeking food in the midst of a famine. Abraham nearly brought a plague upon the Gerarites because of his mistaken belief that the Gerarites would murder him if they knew that Sarah was his wife and not his sister. As the story plays out, Abraham ends


up admitting to Abimelekh that he, Abraham, had erroneously assumed that "surely there is no fear of God in this place, and

Rosh Hashanah is the Jewish New Year, it begins 10 days of penitence and ends at Yom Kippur.

We all know this story. According to a book Kitty gave me there are at least three chosen of this event. Christians see it as a father sacrificing his son like Jesus. Jewish tradition sees this as the binding of Isaac or the son's response represents the people of Israel's response to their ordeals. Like the Jews, Isaac did not choose his fate but was chosen. Muslim tradition says it was Ishmael whom Abraham took to Moriah and willingness of both father and son to bow to Allah's will. In the Muslim story Ishmael knows what is going on. All three traditions might agree this raises some of the most difficult questions ever posed.





Jacob deceives Esau, steals his birthright and fleas. Esau swears to find and kill Jacob. Twenty years will pass before they see each other again.

Isaac and Rebekan clearly are parents who don't mind playing favorites yet they do not communicate with each other. Rebekah is the stronger of the two and talks to God herself, Jacob will get it all. Isaac who loves Esau is outmaneuvered.

Chapter 26

1And there was a famine in the land, aside from the first famine that had been in the days of Abraham, and Isaac went to Abimelech the king of the Philistines, to Gerar.

2And the Lord appeared to him, and said, "Do not go down to Egypt; dwell in the land that I will tell you. 3Sojourn in this land, and I will be with you, and I will bless you, for to you and to your seed will I give all these lands, and I will establish the oath that I swore to Abraham, your father. 4And I will multiply your seed like the stars of the heavens, and I will give your seed all these lands, and all the nations of the earth will bless themselves by your seed, 5Because Abraham hearkened to My voice, and kept My

charge, My commandments, My statutes, and My instructions." 6And Isaac dwelt in Gerar.

7And the men of the place asked about his wife, and he said, "She is my sister," because he was afraid to say, "[She is] my wife," [because he said,] "Lest the men of the place kill me because of Rebecca, for she is of comely appearance." 8And it came to pass, when he had been there for many days, that Abimelech, the king of the Philistines, looked out of the window, and he saw, and behold, Isaac was jesting with Rebecca his wife. 9So Abimelech called Isaac, and he said, "Behold, she is your wife; so how could you have said, 'She is my sister'?" And Isaac said to him, "Because I said, 'Lest I die because of her. " 10And Abimelech said, "What have you done to us? The most prominent of the people might easily have lain with your wife, and you would have brought guilt upon us." 11And Abimelech commanded all the people, saying, "Whoever touches this man or his wife shall be put to death." 12And Isaac sowed in that land, and he found in that year a hundred fold, and the Lord blessed him. 13And the man became great, and he grew constantly greater until he had grown very great.

Hard to believe but here Isaac tells them Rebecca is his sister.


14And he had possessions of sheep and possessions of cattle and much

production, and the Philistines envied him. 15And all the wells that his father's servants had dug in the days of Abraham his father the Philistines stopped them up and filled them with earth. 16And Abimelech said to Isaac, "Go away from us, for you have become much stronger than we." 17And Isaac went away from there,

and he encamped in the valley of Gerar and dwelt there. 18And Isaac again dug the wells of water which they had dug in the days of his father, Abraham, and the Philistines had stopped them up after Abraham's death; and he gave them names like the names that his father had given them. 19And Isaac's servants dug in the valley, and they found there a well of living waters. 20And the shepherds of Gerar quarreled with Isaac's shepherds, saying, "The water is ours"; so he named the well Esek, because they had contended with him. 21And they dug another well, and they quarreled about it also; so he named it Sitnah. 22And he moved away from there, and he dug another well, and they did not guarrel over it; so he named it Rehoboth, and he said, "For now the Lord has made room for us, and we will be fruitful in the land." 23And he went up from there to Beer sheba. 24And the Lord appeared to him on that night and said, "I am the God of Abraham, your father. Fear not, for I am with you, and I will bless you and multiply your seed for the sake of Abraham, My servant." 25And he built an altar there, and he called in the name of the Lord, and he pitched his tent there, and Isaac's servants dug a well there. 26And Abimelech went to him from Gerar, and a group of his companions and Pichol, his general. 27And Isaac said to them, "Why have you come to me, since you hate me, and you sent me away from you?" 28And they said, "We have seen that the Lord was with you; so we said: Let there now be an oath between us, between

ourselves and you, and let us form a covenant with you. **29**If you do [not] harm us, as we have not touched you, and as we have done with you only good, and we sent you away in peace, [so do] you now, blessed of the Lord." **30**So he made a feast for them, and they ate and drank. **31**And they arose early in the morning, and they swore one to the other, and Isaac escorted them, and they went away from him in peace. **32**And it came to pass on that day, that Isaac's servants came and told him about the well that they had dug, and they said to him, "We have found water." **33**And he named it Shibah; therefore, the city is named Beer sheba until this very day.

34And Esau was forty years old, and he married Judith, the daughter of Beeri the Hittite, and Basemath, the daughter of Elon the Hittite. **35**And they were a vexation of the spirit to Isaac and to Rebecca.
