

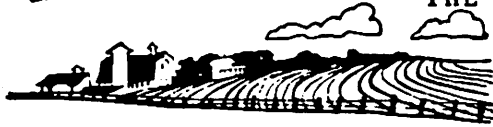

GUILDS CON'T

Some meetings during 1928 were held at East Hall on the college campus. Ms. Frances Murphy being a "House Mother" at the hall. Meetings were held on a regular basis. The officers of 1927 were reelected for the 1928 year: Mrs. Bert Ketcham, president; Alice Boyd, vice president; and Eva Farmer, secretary & treasurer. During the early 1928 meetings Mrs. Hartung gave interesting talks on her trip to Europe. She especially enjoyed Paris. Mrs. Paul Barbour visited and gave interesting talk on Women of the Church. Rev. Haines met on several occasions with the Guild and gave very interesting talks on the work of the church. Bishop Roberts visited the guild at the February meeting. In March the guild began work on a quilt. The guild served a dinner for the Rebecca's at their Hall for their Deanery meeting. 100 plates were guaranteed at 50 cents a plate. A total of \$71.50 realized from this dinner. During much of the summer no new business was conducted. A bazaar was held in April by the church school at Slack's store with most of the handwork being quilts and bedspreads. In September of 1928 Janet Rae present a home talent play in 2 evenings and the proceeds were given to the guild hall fund. This was greatly appreciated. In the fall of 1928 the main events were aimed at making money to furnish the new Guild Hall, needed repairs, and cleaning were also paid for by the guild.
