Listed below is a brief description of the miscellaneous repairs which should be done to preserve Grace Church in Madison, South Dakota. I have made a blueprint of different areas which need attention. Also, we have photos to help direct you to the exact area and help explain.

- 1. Outside on the blueprint there is shown the approximate areas in which I feel would be the best area for down spouts. This would help keep the footing more stable and dry out the basement crawl space. On the blueprint, we have shown concrete splash blocks to be installed. This is very important so that the water can run away from the building. This would also help the one spot where the stone footing has moved approximately 4" from frost which is marked on the blueprint.
- 2. On the south elevation, I have new gutters and down spouts also shown. The down spouts can be moved any where you would like them. I just show them in that particular area, but this area is not really as important. It does have some slope to allow the water to run off so you can put down spouts where you desire.
- 3. On the east elevation where I show frost damage on the stone, I feel that most of the damage has been caused from a leak at the roof area marked "A". Through the years this area has leaked off and on which causes moisture to move between the wall on the inside edge and freeze in the space between the outside and inside walls. This frost damage occurs mostly in the spring due to the melting and the moisture creeping in all winter long and freezing. Then on the warm spring days it thaws and freezes and thaws and freezes and pushes the huge stone wall out and this wall cannot move itself back. The mortar pushes out and causes the stone to collapse and creep downward. Moisture can also work its way in around the windows if they are not caulked or kept tight and create the same problems. These areas are marked on the blueprint.
- 4. The church area marked "D" where frost damage has occured, I feel this has occured by moisture which leaked in up at the bell tower roof and also by the window sill.

- 5. The church in miscellaneous areas needs to be tuck-pointed where mortar has worked out. This should be done with neatness and not allow the mortar to be spread out on the stone. This takes away from the good looks of the church.
- 6. As to the floor slanting to the outside walls, this can be straightened by cutting off posts in the basement with not too much trouble.


This is a brief summary of the work that can be done to help preserve the church. I hope that this will be of help to you in directing the work on the church. I feel that the stone walls will stay fairly stable and not move any large amount if the moisture is kept out of the walls and the areas that need to be tuck-pointed up tight. The walls should stand for quite a few years without further repair. If I can be of any more help, please feel free to contact me.

VISIONS OF A VICAR

In 1983 the Bishop's Committee under the leadership of the Rev. Robert Wagner set forth in draft form a parish self-evaluation along with a mission strategy for the future. Much of what was proposed was never realized because of the departure of Fr. Wagner from the parish.

Recently I had a wide ranging conversation with Fr. Wagner concerning the mission and ministry of Grace Church and he shared the fruit of those strategy meetings with me. I have since reintroduced these documents to the current Bishop's Committee for their review and reflection. Our intent is to evaluate the assessment of Grace Church in 1983 and rethink the mission and ministry of our mission church in light of the current situation. I anticipate that this procedure will take some time, at least if we are to be thoughtful about it, but all of us feel that it is time for this congregation to begin to plan for the future, both in terms of church growth and ministry within, but also in terms of the contributions we can make to the Diocese, our community, and to the church and world at large.

I would like to share with all of you some details of our deliberations so that you too can reflect on how you see Grace Church as a viable community of faith today, but also so that you too can begin to consider what you would have Grace Church be and do in the future. The Bishop Committee would welcome any and all comments, either verbally or in written form.

As you consider these reflections, please keep the following questions in mind:

1. Do you agree with these statements?

2. If not, what would you add or delete from these statements?

3. If so, what are you willing to commit yourself to in the future?

A. How would you characterize Grace Church?

Congregation is composed of hardcore, but small group of dedicated members. Friendly, but maybe "God's frozen chosen"; traditional, yet flexible. Tolerant, inspiring, very independent, though also struggling. Made up of diverse families and individuals. Outgoing, although not always perceived as such. Less resentful toward the Diocese than in the past. Comprehensive, in that we attract both Roman Catholics and Protestants. Evangelistic, warm; members care for each other, but mostly in verbal ways. Not active in community religious life, though the vicar is involved in the Ministerial Association; underperceived by Madison community. Nice services and liturgy

the Ministerial Association; underperceived by madison community. Nice services and liturgy A few people doing a lot; room for others to join and become involved. Energies devoted to maintaining self-existence as a parish Need for full-time clergy. Potential to blossom and bloom.

B. What are the strengths of Grace Church?

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"Ourselves," we are a force, a strength
The fact that we have concentrated on our religious mission, and not so
much on social or political issues.

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A Sunday School that is operative and ongoing.

Our liturgy

We are self-supporting; we have leadership.

We can offer members and newcomers a chance to be part of a church; involvement and participation.

We have a tradition; this gives us meaning and continuity.

Diocesan renewal is occurring, and we can share in that renewal; our relationship with the diocese is improving, though needs some work.

We have an adequate physical plant; improvements have been made.

C. What are the weaknesses of Grace Church?

We have a poor outreach/evangelism program locally; we are not adequately addressing social and political issues in our community and in our state.

Our giving and stewardship could be better.

We are not growing.

We are reticent to try new ventures; we fail to follow-up with newcomers so that they remain with or become part of our Christian fellowship.

We hide our light! We need better public relations.

Our activities our few: we have no choir, no youth group, no men's group, no adult education or Bible studies. Our organizational structure has improved, but needs guidance and direction.

We need to be taught.

We lack a full-time priest.

We do not have replacements to keep the church going when we depart or die. We lack young adults.

* * * * * * *

The Bishop's Committee drafted this mission statement, a statement of purpose for Grace Church, and suggested several ways in which we as a congregation could live out that purpose. Again, is this reflective of what you think we should be doing?

As you consider all of the above, I would also like you to reflect upon a couple of other items that have been on my mind:

- 1. Adult Education: I am available for an adult education series anytime you would like. Let me offer a few suggestions:
 - a. A thorough discussion of the Book of Common Prayer: why it was changed, a theology of liturgy, a theology of the sacraments, how can it be used at Grace Church so as to reflect local tradition and custom?
 - b. A History of the Church: what are our roots, what does it mean for us to be Episcopalians as well as part of the Anglican Communion, the Episcopal Church of America, and the Diocese of South Dakota?
 - c. Bible Studies, beginning with the New Testament: The Gospels, the theology of St. Paul, etc.
- 2. Evangelism and Stewardship:
 - a. Stewardship training: what does it mean for us to tithe; what does it mean for us to be stewards, not only of our money, but also of our time and talents?
 - b. Lay Ministry Workshop: How can we offer our talents and gifts to the ministry of the church and how can we use these talents and gifts to the glory of God?
 - Workshop in parish calling and ministry to the hospital, nursing homes, newcomers, lapsed members.

- 3. Parish Evaluation: I would like to set aside a Saturday in the next two or three months for all of us to conduct a parish self-evaluation using SWEEPS (Stewardship, Worship, Education, Evangelism, Pastoral Care, Service). It takes about 8 hours and requires as full a participation from the entire congregation as we can encourage. Those congregations that have used this program have found it educational as well as giving some concrete ways for growth and renewal.
- 4. In order for any program to work, it requires commitment and participation from all members. All of what has been stated above is good and provocative. None of it makes sense if we are not ready to roll up our shirt sleeves and get to work. This requires ministry of the whole Body of Christ, both lay and clergy. Together we can bring about, with the grace and guidance of the Holy Spirit, renewal in this place. If the church is to be relevant for those of us who are members as well as those outside who need to hear the good news that we are called to proclaim in the name of Jesus Christ, then that same good news must transform each of us so that each of us can be instruments of transformation in our world. This means listening, sharing, learning and praying together, holding always before us the fact that God loves and cares for us, and calls us to be his people through Jesus Christ in the power of the Holy Spirit. I invite all of you to prayerfully consider who we are and what we are called to be for each other and for our world.

Echo's from the Past

The first organized Sunday School had 3 teachers (2 males & 1 fema'e) Mrs. Cleveland was a Sunday School teacher. There were 5 boys and 30 girsl for a total of 35. The average attendance in Sunday School was 20.

Church attendance for Sunday Service was an average total of 48.

The Sunday School library had 1 volume and the Parish library had 1 volume.

Such was the beginning of Grace Church with Rev. Wm Cleveland as Priest.

From register Episcopal History #1:

89 people (men, women, and child n; were entired in from April 21, 1888 in the Church register.

April 1889 21 more names were added through Oc ober 1889.

March 1890 - October 1890 26 more were added.

There was a total of 136 members of Grace Church when it was built in August 1890.

Additional members:

29 people joined in 1891.

44 people joined in 1892.

2 people joined in 1893.

14 people joined in 1894.

26 people joined in 1895.

4 people joined in 1896.

2 people joined in 1897.

This was the end of Rev. Clevelands stay in Madison.

Not all were members every year - some moved, etc.

During the years 1891 through May 16, 1896 Rev. Cleveland baptized 65 persons that were members of Grace Church.

Bishop's Committee Wed., April 16

Senior Warden Hunter called the meeting to order at 7:40 p.m. An opening prayer was given by Karen Hall.

PRESENT: Boyd, Brewer, Hall, Hunter, Johnson, Moose, Page,

Wrobel

ABSENT: DeLay, Stewart

Motion by Moose and second by Wrobel to approve the March 20 minutes. Motion carried.

The bank balance as of March 31 was \$685.39. Stewart was unable to attend the meeting, so a detailed accounting of the finances was not given.

Hunter reported on Karen's ordination to the deaconate in Brookings the previous evening, stating that 8-10 people from Grace were able to attend the beautiful service and reception.

In her Rector's Report, Karen stated that \$679.00 had been collected from the offering at her ordination service. She has opened a Discretionary Fund account with this cash to use for crisis help for the poor and indigent. The accounting of this money would be a regular part of the treasurer's report. She suggested that the loose plate offering of the 4th Sunday of the month be put in this discretionary fund to help anyone in the WAM district who may have immediate and critical needs.

Hunter commented that we had previously done this.

Motion by Wrobel and second by Moose that we designate the loose plate offering on the 4th Sunday to the WAM Discretionary Fund for crisis intervention and direct assistance to the poor in the three churches represented in Karen's jurisdiction. Motion carried.

Karen also informed us that Flandreau wishes to have its Sunday services at 11:00 a.m. In order for her to have Sunday services at both parishes, she asked us to consider changing our services permanently to 9:00 a.m. all year around. There was much discussion about the feasibility of this as a permanent move. Motion by Moose and second by Wrobel to inform the congreation about the problem and have a vote of the church. Motion carried.

Moose and DeLay are to go to Sioux Falls to meet with Bishop Anderson before the next Bishop's Committee meeting. They will discuss with him some of the immediate concerns of the Bishop's Committee, financial and otherwise.

Karen explained that she would like to do the Deacon's Distribution of Communion once a month at Grace. She pointed out that this was not a substitution for a full Eucharist service. All agreed that it was an educational process to enable the congregation to be comfortable with this service. Karen pointed out that she had no problem with any decision that the Bishop's Committee would make concerning this matter.

Motion by Johnson and second by Brewer to have the Deacon's Distribution of Communion once a month, and if a clergy person was unavailable for a Eucharist service that month, then the Distribution would occur twice. Motion carried.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:35 p.m.
