Echo's Of The Past

We are now entering the years of the 30's. Fifty years have gone by at the end of '39 from Grace Church. The biggest change was the building of the Guild Hall. The west end of the church was torn out, the Altar was moved to the east end of the church, the entry door closed and of course the seating reversed. As was common in the drought years, finances became a serious problem.

During these years the priest were A. J. Haines, Henry Pried and R. D. Gaugh, Dale Doren in latter part of 1939. Bishop Hugh Burleson and Blair Roberts still served.

There were 102 communicants recorded for the year 1938. No record was kept of the members as families. In the records of baptisms there are four pages missing, pages 93-94 95-96. No way of knowing if the pages were removed or not.

DIOCESAN BUDGET ITEMS

Diocesan Voluntary Pledge

The Bishop sent out the following statement concerning the voluntary pledge from each parish and mission:

The 1987 budget presupposes some increases in voluntary pledges. He will be going to C-14 (a consortium of 14 eastern diocese who support South Dakota among others) and asking for an increase in how this diocese is doing on voluntary pledges. It is his hope that he will be able to report that the Diocese has increased voluntary pledges. As we consider a budget in this parish for 1987 and our voluntary pledge for 1987, we need to keep in mind that the standard that C-14 has established for voluntary pledges is 25% of parish income designated for diocesan support. 80% of every dollar sent to the Diocese goes for outreach and mission within the Diocese and outside of the Diocese to the larger church. Our diocesan pledge, therefore, is primarily a pledge to reach out and support ministry at the local level.

At the present time our church is giving approximately \$1200 per year to the Diocese. Our challenge from the Bishop is \$1600. We might not be able to meet that challenge, but if each member of the parish would consider a percentage or two increase in their parish pledge, we might be able to increase some and also have sufficient funds to meet current expenses. Hopefully by the first of the year, we will have prepared a proposed budget for 1987 for all of you to look at. It will give you a better idea as to what our obligations are for 1987.

T.I.M.E. Campaign

At our last Diocesan Convention it was agreed that we should try to finish the fund raising portion of TIME by our next Diocesan Convention of October, 1987. To date, of the pledges to TIME, over 60% of the pledged amount has been received. We will receive a letter from the Diocesan office in the next week or so indicating where we stand. As you probably know there is a significant tax break in making contributions during the tax year 1986. While the Bishop recognizes that some persons pledged on the basis of a three year commitment, others have already indicated an interest in completing their pledge by next October. The sooner the money is received the sooner it will go to work for us in increasing the number and training of clergy to provide leadership with the Diocese.

VISIONS OF A VICAR

The season of Pentecost is over--that season where we celebrate the life of the Spirit breathed into the body of Christ, his church. Now we enter into Advent, a season of the church year that gets lost in the shuffle of a media and retail blitz heralding the coming of Christmas. Already we are bombarded with Christmas advertising. The streets on Main Street are being decorated--carols are ringing; plastic angels singing.

But what of Advent? The season of Advent calls us to steal ourselves away—to take time out—from the bustle of the holiday season in order to contemplate the impact of the incarnation of God into this world as one of us, but also to contemplate the coming again of the Christ of God to reign as King of kings and Lord of lords at the end of time.

Advent is a vital link—a link between life in the church in time and space and the Kingdom of God, though present to us in word and sacrament, yet not yet realized in its fullness. It is a link between the promises of God to the chldren of the old covenant and the fulfillment of those promises in the person of Jesus. Advent is a season that provides a way to experience God as unknowable, ineffable, inexhaustible, and God as visibly present and discernible in human history and in the human heart.

To enter into Advent is to embark on a spiritual journey that will take us into the darkest recesses of our own hearts, but also lead us to the brink of eternity. The images along the way are varied: images of God's people being prepared for the coming of Christ as babe and as King; of waiting, of being vigilant and alert; of repentance and reconciliation; of the darkness of sin and living in the light of a new order; of power, of vulnerability; humility, peace; of ultimate judgment and ultimate victory. At the end of the year where the cold of winter presides, Advent offers us this journey into Christ where new birth and life eternal join hands in holy expectancy.

Let us then find those quiet moments to pray and to reflect upon the coming of our Lord--to put the harried moments to rest and prepare our hearts for the coming of the Christ of God into our lives and into the world.


